A s with last year's visit to Dorset, this weekend was organised (?) on similar lines. What was certainly not organised was the weather – which was hot!

We had agreed to stay at the Premier Inn, Glastonbury (built on the site of the derelict Morland's sheepskin factory). Within easy travelling distance from Cardiff, those attending arrived in Somerset by midday. There was no set plan for the weekend, although during breakfast and at the evening meal on Saturday & Sunday, thoughts/suggestions were made on options for the following days' activities.

So, in alphabetical order, the following is an outline of how the weekend was spent.

Glastonbury

Used by many as the first stop on arrival for a cup of coffee. The town itself has attracted over the years an eclectic mix of residents, noticeable in a number of alternative shops to the normal high street.



Glastonbury Abbey

The Abbey is to be the last resting place of King Arthur and his wife

Queen Guinevere. The holy thorn tree found in the abbey's grounds is thought to have sprouted from Joseph of Arimathea's staff. The abbey has been rebuilt and extended several times through its history; however in 1539 it was dissolved and left in ruin.

Glastonbury Tor

Those brave enough to scale its' heights on a hot sunny day would have been rewarded by the surrounding view of the Somerset levels, Dorset, Wiltshire and Wales.


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Ham Wall Nature Reserve (RSPB)

Amazing wildlife (butterflies, dragonflies, marsh harriers etc.) seen from options of four marked trails.

Kilver Court,





Close by is a designer outlet and opposite from (and I'm sure you all remember?) the Babycham factory - now producing cider.



Shapwick Heath

Formerly peat pits, the area has been transformed into a landscape of open lakes, reedbeds, fens and wet woodland.

Perhaps its claim to fame is, although not in summer, the

dramatic scene as millions (??) of starlings twist and turn (known as a murmuration) against the evening sky, before dropping down to settle in the reed beds to roost.

Steart Marshes (WWT)

Tidal area into Bridgwater Bay. Channels and creeks provide a refuge for wetland wildlife.

Views of the surrounding hills; Poldens, Mendips and Quantocks and for those with good sight or binoculars - Brecon Beacons!





The Quaker family – Clarks, started a business in sheepskin rugs, woolen slippers and later boots and shoes. Its headquarters are still in Street but shoes are no longer manufactured there, instead in 1993 redundant factory buildings were converted to form Clarks Village, the first purpose built factory outlet in the UK.

Watchet & Coleridge Cottage

The cottage (NT) was where Coleridge lived for 3 years and wrote many poems including "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner" – a statue of the ancient mariner can be seen on the esplanade of the nearby coastal town of Watchet.

Wells

13th century cathedral city, apart from the cathedral, visits also to moated Bishop's Palace & gardens and

Market Day on the Saturday.

Premier Inn

Breakfast and evening meals were taken at the Brewers Fayre, after chaotic service on the Friday evening, service was rectified the following evening using a "new" service system, none of which detracted from two enjoyable evening meals and 3 rewarding days in Somerset.

Malmesbury and Westonbirt Arboretum £22

Straddling the River Avon, the charming market town of **Malmesbury** has over 1,000 years of history including the original Market Cross, the stunning 12th Century Abbey

with its tomb of King Athelstan, the free Athelstan Museum, and the beautiful Abbey House Gardens.

The nearby **Westonbirt Arboretum** is in Gloucestershire, about 3 miles southwest of the town of Tetbury. Managed by the Forestry Commission, it was planted in the heyday of Victorian plant hunting in the mid-19th century as part of the Westonbirt House estate which is Grade 1 listed among Historic Parks and Gardens of special historic interest.
